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1 Summary

Archaeological monitoring and recording was carried out on land northeast of Granta Cottages, Newmarket Road, Great Chesterford during the construction of a residential dwelling with associated access and landscaping. Monitoring was specifically carried out on all groundworks within the scheduled 4th-century Roman walled town. No significant archaeological remains were encountered.

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


Fig 1 Site location, proposed new dwelling dashed green

2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This report presents the results of archaeological monitoring and recording on land northeast of Granta Cottages, Newmarket Road, Great Chesterford, which was carried out during 11th-15th September 2017. The work was commissioned by Mr Van Kooten and Ms Townsend during groundworks for the construction of a residential dwelling together with associated access and landscaping, and was undertaken by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT). Monitoring was specifically carried out on all groundworks within the scheduled 4th-century Roman walled town.

In response to consultation with the Essex County Council Historic Environment Advisor (ECCHEA) and the Historic England Inspector of Ancient Monuments (EHIAM) they advised that in order to establish the archaeological implications of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with the *National Planning Policy Framework* (DCLG 2012).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with scheduled monument consent, the *Brief for archaeological monitoring at land northeast of Granta Cottages, Newmarket Road, Great Chesterford* detailing the required archaeological work, written by Richard Havis (ECCPS 2016), and a Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) prepared by CAT in response to the brief and agreed with ECCHEA/EHIAM (CAT 2016).

In addition to the scheduled monument consent, brief and WSI, all fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with English Heritage's *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE)* (English Heritage 2006), and with Standards for field archaeology in the East of England (EAA 14 and 24). This report mirrors standards and practices contained in the Institute for Archaeologists' Standard and guidance for archaeological watching briefs (CIfA 2014a) and Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials (CIfA 2014b).

3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background draws on the Essex Historic Environment Record (EHER) held at Essex County Council, County Hall, Chelmsford, Essex.

The proposed development site lies on the southern edge of the scheduled area of the 4th-century walled Roman town (SM 24871). Within the recently published 'The Roman Town of Great Chesterford' (Medlycott 2011) the town wall is shown directly bisecting Granta Cottages. The town wall has been identified on the eastern side of the town off Newmarket Road as a large robbed-out foundation trench. On the southern side of Newmarket Road evidence of Roman coffins are recorded (EHER 4941) as well as further masonry foundations, which may be either part of the walled town or more likely part of the second walled enclosure located around the church (EHER 13922). For further details of the archaeology of Great Chesterford see the Historic Town survey (Medlycott, 1999) and the recent publication on the town (Medlycott, 2011).

In the immediate vicinity of the development site, archaeological evaluations undertaken at 3 and 4 Granta Cottages found evidence of masonry walls. That at no. 3 found evidence of a substantial wall thought to represent the original town wall, with

that at no. 4 finding the remains of a masonry structure inside the walled town area (EHER 48223; Miciak 2013). An evaluation in 2015 to the east of 6 Granta Cottages did not identify any trace of the town wall (CAT Report 864). On land to the west of Granta Cottages and evaluation in 2016 revealed the remains of a large, 2m wide, robber trench aligned SW to NE (CAT Report 988). Probably the remains of the 4th-century Roman town wall, the robber trench appeared to be on the same alignment as part of a wall foundation identified at 4 Granta Cottages. Three Roman pits, two undated pits and an undated linear, possibly a ditch, were also excavated.

In 2015 an archaeological evaluation was carried out on the development site itself (CAT Report 864). Four trial-trenches were laid out across the site revealing a single modern pit of 19th/20th century date and a natural feature. There were no significant archaeological remains.

4 Aims

Archaeological monitoring and recording was undertaken to identify and record any surviving archaeological deposits that may exist on the site.





Fig 2 Results 0 10 m

5 Results (Figs 2-3)

On 11th September 2017, a CAT archaeologist observed the machine-excavation of three pits to remove tree stumps.

Pit 1 measured 4m by 2m and approximately 1m in depth. Excavation occurred through modern topsoil and concrete surfacing (L1, c 0.65m thick, dark brown sandy-silt) onto natural sands (L2, medium yellow/brown sand with frequent gravel piece inclusions). No significant archaeological horizons were encountered.

Pit 2 measured 3.1m by 3.6m and approximately 0.9m in depth. Excavation occurred through L1 (*c* 0.5m thick) onto buried topsoil (L3, *c* 0.25m thick, medium grey/brown sandy-silt) which sealed L2. No significant archaeological horizons were encountered.

Pit 3 measured 3.8m by 2.5m and 1.45m in depth. Excavation occurred through L1 (*c* 0.6m thick) onto L2. No significant archaeological horizons were encountered.

On 15th September, a CAT archaeologist attended the excavation of a soakaway. It measured approximately 1m by 0.7m and 0.5m in depth. Excavation occurred through L1 only. No significant archaeological horizons were encountered.

6 Finds

No archaeological finds were recovered.

7 Conclusion

Despite being located in an area of significant archaeological interest, no significant archaeological remains were encountered.




Fig 3 Representative sections
