1 Summary

An archaeological evaluation (eight trial-trenches) was carried out on land to the north of Meadow Close, Elmstead Market in advance of the construction of a residential development. Located close to a number of cropmarks, the only features identified were a historic boundary ditch visible on the first edition, 6-inch, OS map of 1874 and an undated pit or tree-throw.




Fig 1 Site location in relation to the proposed development (dashed blue)

2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This is the archive report for an archaeological evaluation by trial-trenching on land north of Meadow Close, Elmstead Market, Essex which was carried out on 10th to 11th April 2018. The work was commissioned by South East Developments Ltd in advance of the erection of twenty dwellings with associated access and pedestrian crossing, and was undertaken by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT).

In response to consultation with Essex County Council Place Services (ECCPS), Historic Environment Advisor Teresa O'Connor advised that in order to establish the archaeological implications of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with the *National Planning Policy Framework* (DCLG 2012).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for archaeological trial-trenching*, detailing the required archaeological work, written by Teresa O'Connor (ECCPS 2017), and a written scheme of investigation (WSI) prepared by CAT in response to the brief and agreed with ECCPS (CAT 2018).

In addition to the brief and WSI, all fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with English Heritage's *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment* (*MoRPHE*) (English Heritage 2006), and with *Standards for field archaeology in the East of England* (EAA **14** and **24**). This report mirrors standards and practices contained in the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and guidance for archaeological field evaluation* (CIfA 2014a) and *Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials* (CIfA 2014b).

3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background draws on the Essex Historic Environment Record (EHER) held at Essex County Council, County Hall, Chelmsford, Essex.

The EHER shows that the development site lies within an area which has substantial archaeological evidence as recorded by aerial photography and seen as cropmarks. These include settlement enclosures of probable prehistoric date, a Bronze Age barrow cemetery, isolated ring-ditches, multi-period trackways and field-systems, and possible Roman farmsteads. In particular, cropmarks to the west of the site show a double-ditched trackway as well as other linear features of possible agricultural origin. The orientation of these field boundaries correspond to others seen on historic maps within the development site but which no longer survive (see Fig 1). These predate *c* 1870 and are likely to be earlier in origin.

The Colchester Road to the south of the site is a Roman road which led directly to the Roman town of Colchester to the west of Elmstead Market area. A Roman coin has been recorded south of the road within the village. To the south of Colchester Road cropmarks depicting pits and possible ring-ditches are recorded.

An evaluation in 2018, 400m to the northwest of the development site revealed seven ditches, two of modern date including a field boundary ditch visible on OS maps, a ditch of Roman or medieval date, and four undated ditches. Other features were an undated ditch/pit, a tree-throw, animal burrow and two natural features (CAT Report 1214).

Historic buildings survive within the village of Elmstead Market which date from the 15th century with the village expanding along Colchester Road in the 17th and 18th centuries. The development site lies within the agricultural fields surrounding the historic settlement which have a distinct regular field pattern which surrounds the historic settlement.

4 Aim

The aim of the archaeological evaluation was to ascertain the extent of any surviving archaeological deposits that may exist on site, in order for the ECC Historic Environment Advisor determine whether further investigations would be required.




Fig 2 Results

5 **Results** (Figs 2-6)

Eight trial-trenches, seven 30m long and one 20m long (all 1.8m wide), were machineexcavated under the supervision of a CAT archaeologist.

Two layers were recorded. Modern topsoil (L1, c 0.4m thick) sealed naturally-deposited clay (L2). No significant archaeological remains were identified in trenches T1, T3, T4 (plough scars were observed), T5 and T7.

Trench 2 (T2):

Undated pit or tree-throw F2 was a long, shallow feature measuring 1.16m long, 0.5m wide and 0.11m deep.

Trenches 6 and 8 (T6 & T8):

Trenches 6 and 8 were positioned across a historic field boundary, identified crossing the site diagonally on the first edition, 6-inch, OS map of 1874 (see Figs 1-2). This ditch, F2, was identified in both trenches. It was a thin, shallow, V-shaped ditch measuring 0.4-0.6m wide by 0.15-0.2m deep. No finds were recovered.

There were no archaeological finds.

7 Conclusion

Archaeological evaluation revealed a field boundary ditch visible on the first edition, 6inch, OS map of 1874 and an undated pit or tree-throw. The boundary ditch features on OS maps as late as the 1930s.




 Fig 3 Detailed trench plans: T2, T6 and T8




Fig 4 Feature and representative sections.
