Nature of the work: Observation of emergency trench for electrical mains repair.

**Reason for condition:** The site lies in extremely close proximity to Balkerne Gate, part of Colchester's Roman town wall and a Historic England Grade I listed building (NHLE no. 1123668m and CHER no. DCC18).

% of total seen: 100% of the trench, after its excavation.

**Results:** CAT were called to the observe and record an emergency electrical service repair trench, 6m long, 1.5m wide and 0.8m-1m deep, that had been excavated immediately adjacent to Balkerne Gate in Colchester, Essex. CAT attended the site in response to a request by UK Power Networks after discussions with Will Fletcher of Historic England.

The trench penetrated three layers. The current ground surface (tarmac and stone blocks), including the concrete and sub-base beneath it, were collectively recorded as L1 (c 0.30-0.50m thick) and overlay modern build-up (or possibly buried topsoil) L2 (c 0.18-0.24m thick, friable, dry dark black/brown sandy-silt). L2 sealed a layer of post-medieval subsoil/backfill (L3, friable, dry medium grey/brown sandy-silt with CBM flecks) which was encountered at a depth of c 0.48-0.64m below current ground level and the bottom of which was not reached within the trench. L3 was probably part of the backfill of an early 19th-century reservoir known to have existed in this location




Fig 1 Site location 0





Fig 2 Monitoring results, showing modern services in grey.

(see Figs 1 and 2).

Two features were observed in the sections of the trench. Neither were bottomed. F1 was visible on the north-facing section of the trench, sealed by L2, and was a small oval pit, 0.4m wide, with a distinct layer of oyster shell. F2 was sealed by L1 on the south-facing section of the trench, and was an irregular pit, containing large amounts of brick and concrete within its fill, some of which may have been *in situ*. No finds were recovered from these features, but the fact that they both cut modern or post-medieval layers suggest they are of limited archaeological interest.




Fig 3 Representative sections.
